

ADECADE OF DOMINA



With the conclusion of the spring season, John Carroll's time in the Ohio Athletic Conference has come to an end. After 35+ years of membership, the University has reflected on its success in the OAC and prepares for the road ahead.

In 1989, the administration at John Carroll decided to leave the President's Athletic Conference and rejoin the OAC - having first been in the league from 1932-1949. That choice would set the stage for one of the most important and decorated periods in the history of John Carroll athletics. Over the next three decades, Blue Streak programs would win 177 OAC

championships and 18 individual national championships and produce 382 All-Americans. The athletic department was a model of consistency, routinely finishing at or near the top of the league standings. John Carroll won the Tim Gleason OAC All Sports Trophy 14 times - including 10 consecutive on the men's side. The University is grateful for the partnership with the OAC member institutions and will miss the collaboration and competition.

Now begins a new era for John Carroll athletics as we formally establish our membership in the NCAC - the North Coast Athletic Conference. This is an exciting moment in the university's history as the John Carroll brand hits the national stage. The partnership with our NCAC peers will only further that growth. We are looking forward to establishing new rivalries and introducing John Carroll to new audiences while continuing our relentless pursuit of competitive excellence.

After 35 years. John Carroll University will depart the Ohio Athletic Conference (OAC) on top, winning it's 10th straight Men's OAC All-Sports Trophy and finishing a close second for the Women's OAC All-Sports Trophy. As JCU enters Conference (NCAC) this fall, we look back on a decade of dominance, and a legacy of athletic excellence.

Both the John Carroll University Men's Basketball and Men's Golf teams concluded their tenure in the Ohio Athletic Conference by winning the conference championships in their respective sports. Men's Basketball qualified for the NCAA tournament for the 3rd year in a row and Men's Golf finished in 15th place in the NCAA Tournament, the program's best finish since 1997.

JCU Finishes 39th in Learfield Directors' Cup



For the fourth consecutive school year, the Blue Streaks rank as a top 40 athletic institution in Division III. JCU ranks in the top 9% of the 425 schools in Division III, finishing as the highest-ranked OAC institution and the 2nd-highest-ranked NCAC institution, behind Denison (20th).



The baseball and softball teams ushered in new eras for the 2025 season, thanks to a turfing project completed on Schweickert Field and Bracken Field. The project helped provide a more reliable playing surface for the baseball & softball teams, while also providing additional practice space for all sports.

Basheer Alramahi, a junior runner from Westlake, Ohio, earned All-American honors in both the indoor & outdoor 400m and was part of JCU's 4x400m All-American outdoor relay team. He also received the Elite 90 Award for the 2024-25 indoor track season, awarded to the student-athlete with the highest grade point average at the NCAA championships.

Dakota Houston, a first year sprinter from Beachwood, Ohio was named an All-American four times in 2025. She earned All-American recognition in the indoor 60m, outdoor 100m, outdoor 200m, and was part of JCU's 4x100m All-American outdoor relay team.

Luke Frazier, a senior guard from Mentor, Ohio, was named a Second-Team All-American by the National Association of Basketball Coaches and was named the OAC's Most Outstanding Player.

Named Inaugural Field Hockey Coach

After field hockey was announced as JCU's 25th varsity sport, the Blue Streaks have named Gina Stephan as the Blue & Gold's first head coach of the program. Field hockey will start as a club team in 2025 before transitioning to a varsity sport in 2026. Stephan comes to University Heights after a five-year stint with Bridgewater College (VA), where she doubled the program's win total from 6 to 12 across four seasons as head coach.



squeezes in spin classes at Harness Cycle in Ohio City and still makes time to play fetch with her blue heeler, Blues. Wardrobe changes in her car help make it all possible: "I can do three or four outfit changes a day—my car looks like a gypsy lives there," she laughs. "But it's just the Gab way."

That kind of warmth and humility is what makes Gab stand out-not just in Cleveland sports media, but in everything she does. "I knew right away I didn't want a traditional career," she says. After earning a master's degree in broadcast and digital journalism at Syracuse University's acclaimed S.I. Newhouse School of Journalism, Gab took a full-time job at a news station. "I lasted two months," she admits. "I felt suffocated. I'm a free spirit and I knew right away that I had to do it my way."

That meant following her instincts, taking a chance that her creativity would see her through, and trusting the right opportunities would come. It isn't always easy. "Every year there are gigs that get cut. But somehow new ones always show up," she says. "God always has my back."

Even as her media presence grows, she's anchored by something far more personal. Love Doesn't Shove, the nonprofit she started in 2014 as a John Carroll senior, was born out of her own painful experience with relationship violence. With the support of friends and John Carroll faculty, Gab turned that pain into purpose, launching a one-woman campaign that educates teens to

You won't find this 2014 John Carroll grad toiling away in a typical 9-to-5. Gab's career, like her energy, rewrites the rules. A collegiate All-American runner turned full-time freelancer, she makes her living juggling multiple roles: talking sports on Big Play Sports Network, serving as the in-park host for the Cleveland Guardians, and creating fresh, original content that's been featured by the Browns, Cavaliers, and the I'm From Cleveland Instagram page. She's also the founder—and the heart—behind Love Doesn't Shove, a nonprofit she started in her senior year at John Carroll that brings relationship violence education and healing conversations into schools.

Her schedule is intense and unpredictable—and that's by design. One day might find her editing an episode of her YouTube show Kreuzin' Cleveland, the next filming a segment for her gym, Fitworks. In between it all, she

recognize abusive behavior and empowers them to reach out for help.

Since then, Love Doesn't Shove has become a vital program in classrooms across Northeast Ohio. The workshops can be transformational. She's had students tell her they feel seen for the first time, and many even share their own stories of personal hardship. "I've walked out of classrooms in tears," she says. "You can't un-hear some of the things students go through. I know I can't change their home environments—but I can do my part by listening and hopefully easing their pain just a little bit."

Love Doesn't Shove has grown almost exclusively by word of mouth. "It's probably the most purposeful thing I do," she says. "It feels divine, like I'm just the vessel."

She's thought about taking Love Doesn't Shove full-time, but for now, she'll continue to balance the emotional intensity of that work with the creativity her sports work provides. "All the things I do play off each other," she explains. "Some students already know me from the Guardians or Cavs, and that helps build trust. It all connects."

One of her proudest achievements came last year, when she was inducted into the John Carroll Athletic Hall of Fame in recognition of her remarkable athletic career. As a senior, Kreuz led John Carroll to its first OAC Cross Country title in 22 years and qualified individually for the Division III NCAA Championships, where she earned All-American honors. On the track, she capped her career with eight school records and eight OAC titles, spanning events from the 3K to the

Gab's path has been marked by a willingness to follow her heart. "I just want to says. "And one day, when

Asked if she considers herself inspirational, she deflects. "I've had so many people pour into me," she says, naming mentors like her first boss the late Chris Wenzler '90, the beloved leader of John Carroll's Sports Information Department who passed away in 2020, her mid-distance track coach Mo Banton, and Gridiron Club leader Dave Rastoka '90, who has been a long-standing champion of Love Doesn't Shove. "I'm just a reflection of all those who've lifted me up."

Still, there's no denying the ripple effect she's creating—for students, for young men and women, and for Clevelanders who see in her a rare authenticity. "I'm a storyteller more than an influencer," she says. "I just want to tell stories in a way people can feel."


Music, modeling, and singing are all part of her world toosome on the back burner, some still on the bucket list. Top of that list: To sing the national anthem at a Guardians game.

appreciated the beauty of the campus, and, like Mike, she was moved by the sincerity of the people she met.

Ultimately, their John Carroll experience laid the foundation for two very different—but equally inspiring—careers.

Mike has spent the last 29 years as a high school history teacher in North Allegheny, Pennsylvania, where he teaches iuniors and seniors courses like Honors American History from Truman to Trump and Honors American Foreign Policy. He works hard to bring the connections

between the past and present to life, with activities like an annual field trip to the Flight 93 National Memorial in nearby Shanksville. "I spend a whole day teaching about Flight 93, and then we go out there and the kids get to see it firsthand," he says. "It's always a really emotional day and it's very rewarding to see the kids experience it."

"I have the greatest job in the world," he continues. "I love history, and I love making it matter to my students." Matter it does. One former student, now an astronaut, even gave a shoutout to Mike from the International Space Station, crediting him with sparking an early interest in world events. "That was a proud moment," Mike admits. "You don't always know the impact you're making until much later."

Annmarie has carved out an equally inspiring path in healthcare administration. As Vice President of Women's Health at UPMC, she oversees strategy, innovation, and operations for women across UPMC's 40-hospital footprint "We deliver 25,000 babies a year," she says. "We have to make sure every woman, in every community, gets the same high-quality care, no matter where they live."

Her work spans maternal health, women's health specialties, women's cancer research, and social advocacy. "I'm not a clinician," she explains. "My job is to understand community needs and then build systems that meet them—responsibly, efficiently, and with empathy." She's particularly proud of helping launch a breast cancer vaccine trial and developing programs to reduce maternal mortality.

One of her biggest professional accomplishments—and also her greatest challenge—was leading the launch of UPMC East, a hospital built from the ground up in Pittsburgh's eastern suburbs. "We had no license, no staff, no patients nothing," she says. "Just a vision of what the community needed. It was terrifying, but we built it together. We filled that hospital faster than anyone expected."

And service isn't just limited to their professional lives. Eighteen years ago, they started an annual benefit gala for Autism Speaks that has raised more than \$778,000, making their team the top fundraiser in Pennsylvania. "It started as a small event," Annmarie says. "It's still going strong after all these years."

The Lyons' have also given back to their alma mater in big ways. Mike and Annmarie both serve as regional ambassadors,

program. Annmarie plays an instrumental role on the university's Board of Directors and as a co-chair for the College of Health Task Force. "It's incredibly rewarding to shape the next generation of healthcare leaders," she says. "Especially at a school that shaped me." Mike is an active committee member of the Blue-Gold Club after his induction into the JCU Athletic Hall of Fame in 2019.

The love for John Carroll runs in the family. Their son Matt graduated from the university this past spring,

leaving behind his own legacy as the face of Lobo, the school's newly revived mascot. Their older son, Tommy, is also thriving, with a career in cybersecurity at BNY in Pittsburgh.

Despite all they've accomplished, Mike and Annmarie remain deeply grounded. "We don't set out to be inspirational." Annmarie says. "We just try to live authentically, to follow our values, and to help where we can."



That commitment to authenticity is what makes them so special. Whether in a classroom or a hospital boardroom, this Carroll Couple lives their lives

in service of othersshaped by the values they embraced at John Carroll and strengthened by the community they found there.

The pair is so well matched that it's hard to imagine that they almost didn't become a couple. "We met early on, but we were always just friends," Mike says. "It wasn't until our senior trip that we really started talking." Those conversations almost didn't happen. Mike played for the John Carroll baseball team, and playoffs were scheduled the same week as the senior trip. He wasn't planning on going—until his team lost the final game they needed to qualify.

What felt like a major disappointment turned out to be a life-changing stroke of luck. "If we'd won that last baseball game," Mike says, "I wouldn't have gone on the trip. And I wouldn't have ended up talking to Annmarie. So losing that game? That was the biggest win of my life."





lived in Pacelli and Bernet Halls, attended classes in what is now St. Ignatius Hall (formerly the AD building) and grew close to classmates from Cleveland, Chicago, Pittsburgh, Detroit, and New York. "Our class was tight-knit," he says. "Whether you played sports or not or whether you lived in a dorm or were a day-hop, we all connected. There was a lot of respect, a lot of bonding. Jim spent four years immersing himself in campus life. He ran

track, was a member of the Iota Chi Upsilon fraternity (it was called "the Boosters" back then), joined ROTC, and has fond memories of student traditions like Stunt Night, an annual theatrical competition of satirical skits that helped boost school spirit. But what stayed with him wasn't just the social experiences—he was deeply shaped by John Carroll's academic rigor and Jesuit values. "Philosophy was a mandatory minor. We

learned how to think, how to write, how to reason," Jim says. "It prepared me for everything that came after."

After graduating in 1960, Jim joined the U.S. Army Transportation Corps, rising to the rank of Captain and serving as an aide to General Edward W. Sawyer at Fort Eustis in Newport News, Virginia. He spent eight years in the military and credits the Army's discipline and leadership training as an essential part of his success as a civilian.

When he left the service, he found himself back at John Carroll—this time in a professional capacity. At the invitation of then-president Father Hugh Dunn, Jim served in the university's alumni and development office, helping to grow what was then a small, Cleveland-based alumni association into a national network of connected and committed graduates. Core to their efforts was a group of World War II veterans, who had come back from the war and finished up their schooling at John Carroll. "They were so welcoming. It wasn't just my class of '60 peers, but these other people who were working so hard to help Caroll succeed," he recalls. "Their

welcomeness made it hard not to want to get more involved." That experience, he says, was his first real foray into organizational leadership. "We were learning how to engage people beyond events, and to build community and purpose."

Jim went on to earn his MBA at Case Western Reserve University and made the transition to the private sector, joining Eaton Corporation's management training program. Over the course of a 30-year career, he rose through the ranks, holding key roles in operations and public affairs, and was promoted to Vice President of Government and Community Relations.

Eaton sent him to Washington, D.C., in 1977 to manage its government affairs office. "It was a different world then," he says. "We were helping our executives understand how government and industry intersect." He helped establish Eaton's first political action committee, coordinated visits with lawmakers, and represented the company in major policy discussions, including the passage of the North American Free Trade Agreement (NAFTA).

Despite his demanding career, Jim still found time to stay involved with John Carroll. He served as president of the John Carroll Alumni Association and helped lead a national expansion of alumni outreach. "When I came here, it was an all-male campus. Now it's co-ed, vibrant, and national in scope," he says. "And I've been proud to be part of that evolution."

As accomplished as Jim has been professionally, his personal life has been just as rewarding. His commitment to family (he and his wife Melinda raised five children and now enjoy spending time with their six grandchildren), his decades of civic leadership with organizations such as United Way, Boy Scouts of America, the YMCA, and the Diocese of Cleveland, and his loyalty to his alma mater all point to a life well lived.

When he's asked what motivated him throughout his career, Jim's doesn't hesitate with his answer: "The friendships. The people who pulled me in and believed in me. That started at Carroll and stayed with me for life." Now in his 80s, Jim is still active, still reflective, and still deeply connected to the university he credits with launching him. "John Carroll gave me the foundation," he says. "The confidence to try, the discipline to stick with it, and the relationships that carried me through."

Being present, listening deeply, and paying close attention are core values of a Jesuit education—and if you ask Caitlin Huey-Burns '09, they're also the foundation of good journalism.

Huey-Burns describes journalism as more than a job: it's a way of understanding the world and helping others understand it, too. As a political correspondent for CBS News, she's covered presidential elections, traveling the country and sitting down with some of the most powerful people in the world. But when she's asked about her work, she starts with where it began: a busy college newsroom at John Carroll.

While Huey-Burns had always loved politics, her interest in journalism took root when she walked past The Carroll News office one day and decided to give it a try. That split second decision ended up setting her on a course for life. "We'd be up until four or five in the morning," she remembers. "It was everything you picture in a college newsroom—pizza boxes everywhere, people editing on the fly. And I loved every second of it."

Those late nights in the newsroom with her fellow student reporters and faculty advisors gave her more than great memories. They gave her the confidence to pursue a career in a hyper-competitive field. And the support she received from her professors didn't just boost her confidence; it equipped her with the ability to read critically, think clearly, and write with purpose. "For my job I have to read legislation, dig into policies, and try to present all sides clearly," she explains. "I use that foundation constantly."

Graduating during the Great Recession wasn't easy. She moved back home, started grad school at Georgetown, and took every internship she could find, including stints at NPR, CNBC, and U.S. News & World Report. Eventually, she landed a job as a reporter for RealClearPolitics. "That's when I really got started doing my own reporting, covering campaigns, elections, Congress, the White House, everything politics. And it was just really cool," she says. "The first campaign I covered for them was the 2012 Romney-Obama campaign. The whole time I was pinching myself that I got to do this." Her reporting caught the attention of cable news outlets, who invited her on-air for guest appearances that ultimately led

During the recent presidential election she was assigned to the Trump campaign and crisscrossed the country following him at rallies and public events. In 2024, she landed an exclusive interview with him—one of the biggest moments of her career. "There was a lot of pressure," she says. "I had to ask tough but fair questions, stay focused, and cover a lot of ground in a short amount of time. It was definitely a milestone for me."

to her current role at

CBS News.

Over the course of her career, she's also sat down with Joe Biden, Kamala Harris, Mike Pence, and nearly every major political figure. But in true Ignatian fashion, the conversations she finds most meaningful aren't with politicians they're with voters.

"I love traveling and talking to people," she says. "People are incredibly generous with their stories. They tell you about their struggles, their hopes, what matters to them. That's what keeps me going."

That commitment to telling people-centered stories goes back to her days at John Carroll. "We weren't kept in a bubble," she says. "We were out in the community, doing service and meeting people with very different life experiences. That stayed with me. It's how I try to approach my work, looking at how policies affect real people."

Recently, that approach took her to West Virginia, where she reported on how proposed Medicaid cuts could affect nursing home

residents. "Those are the kinds of stories I care most about," she says.
"I think of it as giving a voice to people who don't have a national platform."

Along with the demands of being a political correspondent for a major national news outlet, she's thriving in another important role: parenting. She and her husband, Matt Rodak '07-also a John Carroll alumlive in Washington, D.C., with their two young children, and juggling deadlines and drop off isn't always easy. "I always knew I wanted to be a journalist," she says, "but I also knew I wanted to be a mom. Trying to do both well is incredibly rewarding and incredibly hard."

That reality hit hard the week she interviewed Donald Trump. It just so happened that the interview was the same week her son was starting preschool. While she made it home in time for his first day, she missed meet-the-teacher night. "I was prepping for one of the biggest interviews of my career," she says, "and all I could think about was the moment at home that I was missing. That push and pull is always there."

Still, she wouldn't trade it.
"The hours are long and the
mornings are early, but most
days it doesn't feel like work,"
she says. "I really can't imagine
doing anything else."

And as for the place where it all started? The values that John Carroll instilled in her are still strong, and she and her husband are still close with many of their classmates. "There's something about that place," she says. "The community, the friendships, the professors—it all left a mark."

Harley Magden '98 had a straightforward plan:

after becoming the first in his family to graduate from college—and soon after, graduate school—he would apply that knowledge and, together with his brother Aaron Magden '02, lead the next chapter of their father's window business.

It made sense. He'd gained hands-on experience working 30 hours a week at the family business while still a full-time student at John Carroll, and it was a path Mikey Magden had envisioned for his sons since they were children. In fact, the window industry ran deep in the family—Mikey's own father had worked in the business as well, making Harley and Aaron the third generation to

However, everything changed when one day out of the blue, to the surprise of both brothers, their father decided to sell the company.

"At first we didn't know what to do—I mean, I invested ten years of my life preparing for something that was now not going to happen," Harley said.

Though as time passed, he slowly came to the realization that what at first appeared to be disappointing news was actually an opportunity hiding in plain sight. "I told my brother this could actually be a better outcome," Harley said. "If we took over the company, we couldn't be sure how involved our dad would still be, and if things went well, people might think it was simply because we inherited it."

And so, after staying with the company for a year and helping both sell the company and find a new CEO, their father retired, and the two brothers decided to start their own business from scratch—a decision that, in hindsight, would come to define Harley's entrepreneurial spirit and mark the beginning of a career shaped by bold action, smart execution, and a special ability to turn challenges into opportunities.

BUILDING WINDOW NATION

Harley and Aaron combined their John Carroll business education with years of handson experience in the industry, and in 2006, they founded Window Nation—a residential window and door replacement company—opening their first showroom in Baltimore, Maryland.

"We started our business with \$60,000 – that's it," Harley said. "There might be this misconception that because our dad sold his company that we had a ton of startup money. But that just wasn't the case—we built it ourselves."

The business enjoyed immediate success, thanks in large part to the values instilled in both brothers from an early age—especially the importance of earning trust through exceptional customer service.

"Literally growing up in windows, we quickly learned that everyone has a choice," said Aaron in an interview with Baltimore Jewish Living. And to earn someone's business, you have to demonstrate that you deserve it. ... So our goal every day is to make our customers feel good about their decision and show we're on their side throughout the entire process and beyond.

To achieve this, the company follows a strict policy against cold calling or door-to-door sales. Instead, they invest heavily in marketing and advertising, encouraging potential customers to contact them directly. Once a customer reaches out, a consultant visits the home to educate them on which products would best meet their needs.

By continually developing and refining innovative sales and marketing strategies, Window Nation has maintained strong momentum. Sales representatives are required to complete 100 hours of training before interacting with clients ensuring a knowledgeable, customer-focused experience from the start. As a result, the company has enjoyed remarkable growth and now operates in 36 markets across the country, with over 3 million windows installed to date.

"Looking back, what really set us apart was being opportunistic, proactive, and staying positive, Harley said. "During challenging times—whether it was a recession or the pandemic—most companies pulled back and played it safe. But we took the opposite approach. We asked ourselves, 'How can we use this moment to move forward?""

DRIVEN TO SUCCEED, COMMITTED TO GIVING BACK

Window Nation's private equity journey began in 2018, when the company sold a majority stake to Cortec Group. In 2021, it took another big step by selling additional shares to AEA Investors LP. After this second transaction, the brothers retained a stake and have remained on the board,

continuing to help guide the company's growth and success.

Rather than stepping back, the brothers have continued to channel their entrepreneurial drive into a wide range of ventures—from owning and actively investing in seven restaurants, to launching an exotic car business, to serving as managing directors at a private investment firm.


While the nature of each project is different, what remains consistent is Harley's drive and deep commitment to the success of everything he's involved in.

Take Mikey & Mel's Famous Deli, for example—opened in 2020 and named for the brothers' father and grandfather, and inspired by the Jewish delis the Magden family frequented while growing up in Cleveland. Earlier this year, the brothers expanded the concept with a second location in downtown D.C.

To navigate the growing pains of launching the new spot, Harley spent significant time working in the kitchen himself—doing whatever it took to solve operational issues firsthand.

"Just a couple months ago, I was in the kitchen to help my team figure out a set of problems," he said. "So I said, 'I'm going to go in there, be hands-on, and figure it out.' I'm probably the worst person to have in a kitchen—I can't cook, I have no patience, and half the food I don't even want to look at, let alone eat. But sometimes, you've just got to get deep."

Increasingly though, Harley has found great purpose and satisfaction in advising other fledgling entrepreneurs and using his experience to reduce their learning curve and navigate challenges that he's had to overcome.



"If people follow through, it feels like you win too," he said. "It feels like you're paying it forward."

In the spirit of giving back, during a recent visit to John Carroll's campus, Harley spoke with a student who asked for advice about choosing a major.

"I told him what matters is figuring out what fits your skill set—and then going all in on it," Harley said." If you're confident and committed, you'll do well. In the grand scheme of things, the classes themselves aren't what define your future. It's about your drive, your mindset, and the people you surround yourself with."

Harley's success is no accident but rather the result of grit, focus, and a relentless drive to keep pushing forward. That mindset has guided him through every challenge and venture he's pursued.

"There's opportunity everywhere," he said.
"You just have to be willing to go after it."


Lioined the Boler College of Business as the Executive in Residence focusing on leadership development in the Fall of 2018,





Titled "America's College Towns Go From Boom To Bust" the article features the demise of Western Illinois University and starkly states "across the U.S. colleges are faltering and so are the once booming towns around them." Locally in greater Cleveland, Notre Dame College closed and Ursuline College was forced to merge with Gannon University to survive. Even mighty Penn State has closed 7 of its 20 campuses. Is JCU up to meeting this challenge?

One year ago at our 60th reunion we attended a very professional and comprehensive presentation of the University's five year plan to stay ahead of this alarming trend of declining enrollment leading to unsustainable financial losses. The plan specifically focuses on enhanced rcruitment, the economic development/student housing project at Fairmount Circle, increasing meaningful academic offerings like our Nursing School, and extensive campus expansion and renovation, of which our project is a major element. Are these efforts paying off you ask? A recent report reveals very promising trends: In 2024 Carroll welcomed our largest incoming class in five years. We also recently hosted a recordbreaking Admitted Student Celebration for 2025 including 420 admitted students and 1200 guests attending. The freshman class for 2025 shows early confirmations exceeding the past five years by more than 60%, receiving nearly 5,000 applications and admitting 3600 students from 40 states. Hats off to this powerful follow through by the administration validating our substantial commitment to the effort.

The big advantage of staying in ROTC was that if you had to go to Vietnam, you went as an officer instead of a "grunt." Fortunately for Russ, he was never sent to Nam as he opted for longer Active Reserve Service to stay stateside. Russ lives in Asheville, North Carolina, with his wife. His children are grown and living elsewhere. He and his wife suffered the wrath of Hurricane Helene. I tracked Helene out of the Gulf, across northern Florida, up through Georgia, into Tennessee. I was concerned because I have friends who live in north Florida, two daughters who live in Atlanta, and a granddaughter who is going to UT. However, I never thought that Helene would do much to North Carolina because it looked like they would only be getting tropical storm winds.

My wife and I have lived in South Florida since 1973 and have experienced numerous hurricanes and tropical storms. We only get nervous if a hurricane is threatening to strengthen to a category 4 or 5. So, I was stunned by the devastation done to North Carolina. However, as I thought more about it, I began to understand that the mountainous terrain and remote areas, combined with the extremely heavy rains, caused unbelievable amounts of damage. And while things are better, there is still so much devastation.

Don Burkhart retired from the Wyoming House of Representatives after 14 years of service to the people of his District and Wyoming. This followed his retirement ten years ago from the petroleum industry. During his time in the Legislature, he was privileged to serve as Speaker Pro Tempore for a term, was Chairman of three different committees, awarded the Patrick Henry Award by the National Guard Association of the United States, was given a Special Award by the American Nuclear Society for work in bringing the nuclear energy industry to Wyoming, and represented Wyoming on national and international committees. first Jesuit ever to be elected pope. And the church really hadn't elected a pope from a religious order since 1830... The Jesuit order was founded by St. Ignatius Loyola in 1540, and largely for the care of souls, with a focus on the intellect. Pope Francis grew out of that. He served, had a great love for the poor in his native Argentina, but rose to become Archbishop of Buenos Aires. And when he was elected pope and he came out, he had this very humble demeanor So the first Jesuit, I think, is an opportunity to see the power of religious orders in the church and also a voice from a different continent." 




